




**SECRET MESSAGE
MORSE CODE SCARF**

This fun to make scarf uses color and thread count to represent the dots and dashes found in Morse Code to spell out **Flock 24**.

You can use this formula to spell anything that will fit the width of your loom.

- For our example: Light sock weight yarn.
- * Orange represents the dots and dashes.
- * Teal separates the dots and dashes (2 threads).
- * Brown is used for the spaces between the letters.
- * Aqua is used for the space between the words and for the 8 threads on each border.
- * Teal is our weft.

16" Loom
10 Dent Heddle approx. 90" long warp.



**** Note - Begin by warping 8 Aqua threads for the border. They are not shown in the charts.**


Let's take a look at how the pattern is translated from Morse Code.

Above you see the entire phrase **Flock 24**

The example below is the letter **F**, our 1st letter in the word Flock.







Written in code the letter F is: dot, dot, dash, dot, as you see written below the graph.

We use two threads for the Dots and 4 for the Dashes and have ended the sequence with 2 threads of brown as our letter separators.



With this method, you can now translate any Morse Code into a "Secret Message Scarf"!

Let's continue with the remainder of our message.



End with 8 Aqua for the border edge - not shown.
Use the Teal yarn as the weft. Weave plain weave throughout.

If you are using different colors, something to keep in mind is that the warp should have high contrast and the weft yarn should be the color of the dots and dashes for best visibility so that the stripes (our dots and dashes) show clearly.
